

A Message from Gill Laughlin

As I write this, it's hard to believe that it is less than two weeks since we were saying 'Goodbye' to a rather miserable 2020. We had past the shortest day of the year; we had celebrated (in an unusually muted way) the Christmas season and we were welcoming in a bright new year, full of hope for the new vaccines and the early end to the Corona Virus restrictions. And here we are, suddenly in a new lockdown, with dangerously high levels of infection and a larger weekly number of deaths than we have seen in a generation. Even our Church services have been abandoned again, although that does not prevent us from worshiping God in our own homes, of course!

I suspect that many people have been asking, 'Why would a loving God do this to us?' Well, I don't believe He would. Surely, our problems are brought about by human beings going our own way and thinking that we can manage our lives without God's help. That is not to say that each person who suffers is individually responsible for their own suffering, but that humankind as a whole is disobeying God's will and, as disaster falls upon us, even Saints suffer.

However, as I go for my daily walk in the countryside, I still see signs of God's wonderful love, which give us hope for the days to come. There are sticky buds on the horse chestnut trees, waiting to burst into leaf, there are primroses flowering in sheltered corners of my garden, the daffodils are beginning to grow and daffodils are actually in bloom in a neighbour's garden; life is returning all around me. And so, my hope for 2021 is renewed. We must just turn to God and, trusting in his love for us, renew our efforts to care for our planet and its people.

Meanwhile, we can look for the good things that have come out of our experiences of the past year. In the latest Diocesan news, there is a story about a couple who bought a house in a cul-de-sac in Coventry. They hoped to become part of a neighbourhood community, but this did not happen in the first year, however, during 2020 they proposed a whatsap group and the neighbours were quick to join and have now formed a close-knit community, which lovingly supports one another. Similarly, our own Church communities have looked for new and innovative ways of keeping in touch with one another and with God. The Minster has held weekly on-line Services, which have attracted more than our usual congregation numbers and, on Christmas Eve, there was a very successful Drive-in Carol Service. This has led us to contemplate how we can use some of these innovations to help spread God's word in the future and I hope that, when she arrives in March, our new Rector will feel that we have used the time of the interreanum well.

Meanwhile, let us pray for the sick around the world and those who care for them and dedicate ourselves afresh to the service of God in what continue to be difficult times.

Studley Isolation Support Group **update** May 2020 Edition 2

Now, more than ever, the community in our village are pulling together to support each other. The Studley Isolation Support Group supports all those who are isolated, alone, elderly or vulnerable. With Studley in Business and the Parish Council, we have built a core team of around 50 volunteers who carry out tasks on a daily basis. So far we have supported 165 households and undertaken over 1000 tasks. These range fromshopping, prescription collection to dog walking and daily newspaper deliveries.

Nothing is too much trouble for our volunteers, and we actively encourage anyone who is having to isolate, with no close family close by to help them, to give us a call on **07933 093268** from 9am to 5pm Monday to Saturday.

If you have a neighbour you are concerned about then please ask them to call us. Our aim is for everyone who is vulnerable to stay safely at home. No one who should be isolating needs to do any shopping, our volunteers are shopping ninjas!

We will be here for as long as necessary, and alongside our day to day tasks we can arrange for someone to call you for a chat, drop off some books or jigsaws, post letters etc. We are here for you.

Please note that we operate a password system to protect you. Please do not open the door to anyone you don't know, unless they can tell you the password that YOU have chosen. There are scammers capitalising on the current situation, and we want everyone to stay safe. Always follow the Government's Social Distancing guidelines

Many volunteers are busy sewing scrubs, bags, headbands and facemasks. They are in need of new material (that can be washed at 60 deg), elastic & buttons about the size of a 2p. If you can help then please call the Isolation Support Group on 07933 093268. Arden Foodbank is working hard to supply food parcels to our community. Anyone who is struggling can request a voucher. Parcels can be collected from the Methodist Church on Tuesday afternoons, or one of the Isolation Support Group Volunteers can collect and deliver it for you. Nature jottings from Perrymill Lane

Our involvement with the natural world has inevitably continued to be limited to the lanes around Sambourne and Coughton, and our own garden. However, there is still great pleasure to be obtained from observing the more "everyday" species.

22nd Dec. Several Yellowhammers occupied trees by a barn in Coughton Lane.

31st dec. A mixed flock of more than 100 corvids (Jackdaws, Crows and Rooks) were feeding in a field beside the footpath to Coughton. We stopped to watch a Dunnock in the hedgerow. Easily dismissed as "little brown jobs" they are most attractive birds when viewed in good light that shows off the contrasting grey and brown plumage.

2nd Jan. For the first time this winter I noticed two Siskins visiting our sunflower heart feeder. They soon departed and were replaced by a party of Long-tailed Tits.

5th Jan. We had another Yellowhammer sighting in Coughton Lane.

9th Jan. A Song Thrush flew from a tree in Sambourne Lane and a Great Tit was calling clearly in Wike Lane. Chris described the technique of a Blackbird in his Middletown Lane garden using a fatball as a pendulum, taking a peck each time the fatball swung towards it.

13th Jan. A flock of about 10 Starlings were feeding in the field behind our garden. To my mind this is worthy of comment because Starlings are no longer a common sight for us.

15th Jan. A sad occasion caused us to head south to Somerset on an essential journey. The journey was slightly brightened in both directions by the sight of a Red Kite flying overhead near Beckford.

17th Jan. A few Meadow Pipits and Yellowhammers were visible in the trees by the barn in Coughton Lane.

18th Jan. After a period of intermittent visits to the garden by a Great Spotted Woodpecker, today we had a male and a female feeding on the sunflower hearts and peanuts, and having a peck at the bark of our old apple tree.

19th Jan. We had a good view of a Mistle Thrush and a Song Thrush close together in a tree in Wike Lane. This gave a great opportunity to compare the size and the markings of the two species.

Although the time for the Big Garden Birdwatch will have passed by the time you read this, I hope anyone interested will have taken part. What better way to spend the enforced time at home than taking an hour to see what visits your garden?

We may be closed over the winter but our conservation team are still hard at work carrying out the deep clean of the house ready for when we re-open in spring. During the closed months archive documents are photographed and filed, all of the brown wood furniture is dusted and museum wax is used to clean iron, steel, copper and brass which provides a protective seal for the next season.

By February we are deep into our annual clean and it's a really good time for the team to condition check each object in the collection. This includes checking the books in the Saloon which are susceptible to mould and waxing the floors which is a big job for the conservation team.

Our sister properties over at Baddesley Clinton and Packwood are open all year except Christmas Eve and Christmas Day. There's something magical about walking in winter, from hearing the frosty grass crunch underfoot to seeing low-lying mists sweeping across the countryside, the first months of the new year are the perfect time to wrap up warm, throw on some wellies and go for an invigorating walk. Blow away the cobwebs along blustery canal paths or take a frosty stroll across the Warwickshire countryside, now is the ideal time to get outside and enjoy the outdoors.

Following the Prime Minister's announcement of a lockdown in England, the gardens and parkland at Baddesley and Packwood will remain open for local people to exercise. The safety of staff, volunteers and visitors from the nearby community remains our priority. We know how important it is for people to seek fresh air and nature and we urge visitors to stick to the rules and stay local.


